The New Agreement Between CHS & the Village of Corrales

On January 10, 2017, the Village Council approved a new Agreement between the Corrales Historical Society and the Village of Corrales. The Agreement represents our new relationship with the Village as to the management, maintenance and preservation of the historic Old San Ysidro Church property.

In this arrangement, CHS will act as the Village's rental agent to those people or organizations who would like to use the Old Church building or grounds. Showing the building, scheduling dates and contracting for the events will be done by CHS. All rental fees, deposits and possible gross receipt taxes will belong to the Village.

The Village in turn will compensate CHS for its efforts in marketing and promoting the use of the Old Church as a unique venue for appropriate public and private uses. The compensation will also cover any necessary building maintenance, cleaning and grounds upkeep in support of outside events.

The Society will retain free use of the Old Church, Annex and grounds for all activities we sponsor for the public (Heritage Day and Speaker Serie to name a few). CHS will pay the non-profit rental rate for any closed activities, workshops or fundraising events we hold in the Old Church.

The Board is looking forward to working with the Village administration. We anticipate an increased awareness and use of the Old San Ysidro Church in our community and beyond. We know the Old Church will remain the historic and cultural Heart of Corrales.



MEMBERSHIP

During 2016 our memberships grew from 266 to 283, an increase of about 6.5%. Actual members are now 453. To increase this number, we plan to have a membership drive in 2017. Information will go to every Corrales household. This will introduce or reintroduce all residents to CHS. Our goal is to promote membership by increasing residents' awareness of the special place the Old Church has in our community and to encourage participation in its activities through joining us.

This year saw several improvements. The Membership Committee is establishing two positions to assist new Docents in becoming a comfortable and active part of the group. There will be a Docent Membership Chair and a person in charge of Docent Training. Another improvement is the availability of a membership application and PayPal capability on the CHS website, www.corraleshistory.org. We have seen an increase in both current members who are renewing via PayPal and several new members have used the CHS website to join us, as well.

Membership continued to have a table at each Speaker Series program and other Old Church events. Although our purpose is to enroll new members, we more frequently act as a welcoming table for visitors and a source of information about the Old Church. We have made many new friends and we gained several new members who joined us after the events.

NEW MEXICO HERITAGE PRESERVATION AWARD

2016 was the centennial anniversary of the founding of the National Park Service as well as the 50th anniversary of the passage of the National Historical Trust Act. May was also Heritage Preservation Month, which was established in 1973 by the National Trust for Historic Preservation.

Many special events, exhibits, performances, lectures, and recognition ceremonies were held throughout our state celebrating New Mexico's unique heritage, history and cultures.

On May 13, 2016, the Cultural Properties Review Committee, part of the New Mexico Preservation Division of the Department of Cultural Affairs, presented its 44th annual Heritage Preservation Awards at the Scottish Rite Center in Santa Fe. The award categories included Individual Achievement, Architectural Heritage, Community Preservation Planning, Heritage Organization, Heritage Publication, State Historian's Award of Excellence, and the Lifetime Achievement Award.

The Corrales Historical Society, The Village of Corrales Administration, **Corrales** Fire Department, and Ed Crocker, Ltd. won their award in the Heritage Organization category. The award was in recognition of the outstanding dedication, diligence, teamwork and organization displayed in the repairing and preservation of the historic Old San Ysidro Church after it was severely damaged in the July 2013 storms.

Accepting the awards were myself, Susan Cahill, President of the Corrales Historical Society, Commandeer Tanya Lattin of the Corrales Fire Department and Ed Crocker of Ed Crocker, Ltd. These organizations, as well as the overwhelming support of our members, our community and friends have once again made the Old Church the cultural and historic heart of Corrales.

We are honored by this recognition of our efforts.

THE NEW CHS LOGO

The new Corrales Historical Society logo represents the history of Corrales in a style for today. A big departure from the now retired CHS logo, the new logo sets itself apart from other historical society logos. Our progressive, future-acting organization is reflected in this new logo.

During the past year and a half, CHS significantly increased efforts to continue to keep Corrales history alive, promote the Society, and market the Old Church as an events venue to generate additional funds for preservation and maintenance of the Old Church. Most of our reserves were used to repair damages discovered after the summer storm of 2013. While reviewing printed and online materials, the CHS



Marketing Team discovered that multiple images were being used as logos and that the actual logo was looking dated and somewhat old-fashioned.

Desiring a new logo to represent CHS with integrity and one that would more accurately reflect our current marketing and preservation initiatives, Susan Cahill appointed a logo team including Virginia Breeding, Jannie Dusseau, Nan Kimball, Carolyn O'Mara, and Lisa Sparks. In designing the new logo, the team wanted to include not only the Old Church—the historic heart of Corrales—but also significant historical features that reach beyond its doorstep. Thus, the new logo incorporates agricultural elements and the Rio Grande, which is featured prominently in the logo as it is the lifeline to this community. Without the river, Corrales would not be the vibrant, agrarian community that it is.

The team worked many hours over more than two months and sorted through dozens of ideas and renditions to develop this design. The group focused on basic logo design elements, colors, and fonts, as well as flexibility of presentation for a variety of uses—stationery, website, ads, newsletter, Facebook and flyers, to name a few. Guidelines for logo usage and various file formats are available on the CHS website. While never losing touch with our history, we are striving to make CHS an entity that will continue to grow and prosper. The new logo reflects this.

ARCHIVES COMMITTEE

The two major goals of the Corrales Historical Society Archives Committee are to collect information about the history of Corrales and make it accessible to the public. Much of our work expands and strengthens the Society's connections with the people of Corrales, particularly those who have lived here for many, many years. The Committee includes Corrales residents who love history and have a variety of skills which are put to good use in the service of those goals.

Our paper collection now includes hundreds of newspaper articles, transcriptions of interviews, maps and drawings, manuscripts, notes from interviews, agency documents, and letters. Our collection of videos of panel discussions, speakers, and interviews are on disc and have been catalogued by Committee member Kitty Tynan.

Our photograph collection numbers well above 1,000 pictures. As we collect photos, we obtain as much information as we can on the date when the photo was taken and on the subjects in the photos. They are then scanned onto the CHS computer in the annex and returned to their owners. The photos are filed by subject matter, roughly corresponding to our paper material index. Photo inventory forms have been completed for family photos, agricultural scenes, and the Old Church. In 2017, we plan to complete forms for our 1950s photo aerials, photos of Corrales celebrations, Corrales artists and writers, and pictures of Corrales after World War II, among others.

During the past year, Committee members Dorothy Trafton and Marty Kuehn, updated the information on deceased Corrales residents included in our 2001-2016 memorial books. Committee member Stan Betzer has created an alphabetical index for each volume; they provide an arresting record of Corrales history. Committee member Barbara Williams repaired some of our display boards and we had them laminated for better protection. Barbara also prepared information for the Harvest Festival displays.

The Archives Committee's major public event is Heritage Day in mid-May. In May 2016 the Committee prepared exhibits and photo displays depicting Corrales' long agricultural traditions. CHS members, Cliff Pedroncelli and Dorothy Trafton, loaned us many pieces of equipment that their families had used during the first half of the 20th century. With the help of Iowa

transplant Bud Bolsinger, the trio collected, labeled, and transported the equipment. Corrales artist and farmer Gilbert Lopez graciously lent us his two big paintings of Corrales agriculture as he remembered it from his boyhood. His daughter Loretta lent us a series of color photos she had taken of her 93-year-old father as he went about planting and harvesting his corn, melons, chiles, grapes, and peaches. Our speakers on "farming then and now" included Cliff Pedroncelli, Bonnie Gonzales, Elan Silverblatt of Silverleaf Farms and Roxanne and Jimmy Wagner on farming today.

Committee member Dorothy Trafton, who was to speak on farming in yesteryears, filmed a video about farming equipment. Committee members Nan Kimball and Joan Regan helped conduct a "history hunt" that challenged "hunters" to find historical elements in the Old Church, Casa San Ysidro and the cemetery. Nan and Joan also organized and managed craft activities. Displays featured not only agriculture, but also memorials to three Corrales residents who died during the past year: Evelyn Losack, I rene Tafoya, and Phil Modica. Joneve Losack Bender helped us prepare a display on her mother's life and accomplishments. Edwina Tafoya brought her mother Irene's wedding dress plus a dressmaker's stand to display it on and her mother's wedding photo. Ted and Pat Modica and the Peterson's brought four restored older tractors to display, all accompanied by descriptive material. And for many the highlight of the day was the dedication of a bench honoring Evelyn Losack. CHS president Susan Cahill spoke about Evelyn's contribution to CHS and then introduced the speakers: former State Senator Pauline Eisenstadt, Councillor Phil Gasteyer, author Stacia Spragg Braude, and bench maker Anthony Romero.

The Archives Committee stayed with the agricultural theme with some displays at Harvest Festival activities at the Old Church. For this occasion the farming equipment was loaned by long-time Corrales resident Ralph Martinez as well as Dorothy Trafton. They attracted lots of attention in the courtyard in front of the church. An old hay rake, lent by Martinez and carefully positioned by Ralph and his son John outside the northwest corner of the church, was especially popular.

We are now hard at work preparing for this year's Heritage Day that will focus on Corrales mothers since it will be held the day before Mother's Day. It will feature videotaped interviews with families with and about their mothers, craft activities preparing gifts and cards for mothers, photo displays about Corrales mothers who held non-traditional jobs, family tree making, and exhibits of such domestic animals as rabbits and chickens, whose care often fell to mothers. The Committee plans in the coming year to address how to make our extensive holdings more widely known and accessible to

the general public. To do so we will be looking for CHS members knowledgeable about how this can be done using the CHS website. We welcome new members. Who We Are

The Corrales Historical Society Docents are a team of 60 community volunteers whose mission it is to educate the public about the Old San Ysidro Church as it relates to the history of Corrales and the Casa San Ysidro and Camposanto (cemetery). CHS Docents collaborate with Casa San Ysidro by "sitting the Old Church" on the second Saturday of each month, 1-4 PM, starting tours in February and ending in September (for dates please visit our website www.corraleshistory.org). Partnering with Casa San Ysidro allows CHS and Casa to share ideas, unify our missions to invite more visitors to enjoy the history of the" Heart of the Village."

What We Do

The Docents offer support for special events such as Harvest Festival, Heritage Day, Speaker's Series, Mudding Day/Clean Up Day, Annual Meeting, and any other special event relating to the Old Church. We also support the preservation and maintenance of the Old San Ysidro Church by raising money through sales of Shop in a Basket—our version of a gift shop which netted \$1,000 in sales at the CHS Fine Crafts Show in December 2016!



We then toured the art gallery, interpretive displays and the gardens and climbed the stairs to the tower to view the cranes, geese and the open fields in the back of the center. On December 16, we enjoyed a night at the Old

Church for the Annual Holiday Dinner, organized by Ginger Foote and her committee. It was a lot of fun and had great attendance by Docents, their families, and guests. Thank you to John Perea of Tijuana Bar for serving refreshments.

Two docents are scheduled to provide refreshments at every regular meeting throughout the year. Linda Dillenback chaired this committee in 2016. Thank you to all who helped.

Docents participated in the Retablo Workshop held by the Corrales Historical Society. Several visitors came by and the docents gave them tours of the Old Church during the lunch hour.

Preservation and Maintenance

Once the exterior of the **Historic**Old Church was repaired and re-mudded in 2015, the Society completed the preservation project in 2016 by refinishing the exterior paint of this lovely old building. This involved scraping and glazing all the exposed wood surfaces around the windows, screens, and the main entryway bordering the main door on the east side of the building. We then had a coat of primer and two coats of high grade white paint applied. Hopefully this will last for several years.

The Society also commissioned an artist to fashion a bench from one of the limbs of the old cottonwood tree that had to be removed from the north lot line of





the property. The limb had been preserved by local artist, **Jen Northup**. She stored it until it was taken to a woodworker to be made into a wonderful bench, now

was taken to a woodworker to be made into a wonderful bench, now nestled in the trees to the south of the main courtyard.

In 2016, we developed a list of several necessary projects to protect the Old Church roof and ceiling and have implemented a policy of replacing burned-out floodlights inside the building with energy-efficient dimmable LED bulbs.

Additionally, there are more needed repairs to the Annex building, which houses the restroom facilities, kitchen, office and storeroom for the Church. These involve installing gutters and downspouts on the South side of the annex, repairs to the south walls caused by rain flowing off the annex roof, along with some other minor repairs and replacements.

This is my last report to the members of the Corrales Historical Society. I have enjoyed working with the Board and the Society over the past six years. They are a dedicated group and I wish them well in the future.

As CHS Publicity Chair, it's my privilege to promote the entertaining and educational programs that are organized by the many dedicated CHS volunteer coordinators and board members. All programs serve to keep the rich history of Corrales alive and support the ongoing preservation of the Old San Ysidro Church.

For 2016, CHS continued to strengthen our partnership with Casa San Ysidro, helping to promote the Historic Heart of Corrales, consisting of the Old San Ysidro Church, Casa San Ysidro and the Camposanto (cemetery). CHS continues to keep the Old Church open for tours when possible on Casa's 'Second Saturday' programs, and works in tandem with them on many other events. We also continued our relationship with Corrales MainStreet and appreciate the dedicated CHS article we run in their quarterly newsletter.

Sales remained strong at both the October Old Church Fine Arts Show and the December Old Church Fine Crafts Show, put on by the CHS Visual Arts Council. Being able to accept credit cards has helped to enhance sales. Our online partners, CHS website and Facebook page also play a big part in getting the word out on these events.

CHS Speaker Series Coordinator Nancy Kimball brought us a wide range of interesting guest lecturers in 2016. Topics included History of the Acoma Pueblo, the Magdalena Stock Driveway, a Chautauqua on Georgia O'Keefe, and... a program about Who, and What, it took to pull off the monumental restoration and repair of the Old Church.



In January, Phil and Barbara Bock, Jim Arnholz, and Sara Voorhees, shared their memories of performing at The Adobe Theater at the Old Church. The audience was filled with both patrons of the Adobe Theater in Corrales and those who enjoy the Adobe Theater in its current location. Following the 2016 CHS Annual Meeting in February, members and guests heard from a panel whose members were involved with the Restoration and Repair of the Old Church. Preservation expert Edgar Boles, Edward Crocker of Crocker LDT, Commander Tanya Lattin of the Corrales Fire Department and Dick Foote explained their role in the project. March brought many Georgia O'Keeffe enthusiasts to the Old Church for the program "O'Keeffe: Close Up and Faraway," a Chautauqua presentation by Deborah Blanche, supported by the New Mexico Humanities Council. The Magdalena Stock Driveway on the Plains of San Agustin was the topic of our April program. Brenda Wilkinson, Archaeologist for the Bureau of Land Management, brought the 120-mile long, five-to-ten-mile wide livestock driveway to life through stories and beautiful photographs. Audience members included cattlemen and residents of Socorro County who shared their memories of seeing the sheep and cattle drives to the Magdalena Railroad Depot. In conjunction with a CHS-Casa San Ysidro docent bus trip to Acoma Pueblo, Grants and Gallup, Carol Louis from the Sky City Cultural Center presented The History of Acoma Pueblo: the Sky City in May.


Film historian, freelance film writer and author, Jeff Berg made a return appearance at the Old Church in September with a new set of clips from movies Made in New Mexico. Ranging from the 1890s through current day films, the audience was able to see familiar landscapes and landmarks as the backdrop to a wide variety of films. Just in time for Halloween, local author and skeptic Benjamin Radford explained several Mysteries and Myths of New Mexico and Corrales. Focusing on local legends, such as La Llorona, Ben explained how, using science, folklore, history and psychology, he is able to track down the source of local legends and myths and explain why they become part of the community story. The final program of 2016, Dean Robb: From Wall Street to UNM, brought to life J. Donald Robb, Dean of the UNM College of Fine Arts from 1942-57, in a presentation by Phil Bock. The audience was given the opportunity to hear recordings of some of Dr. Robb's compositions and the story of his journey from working on Wall


Street in New York City as an attorney, to collecting folk songs in New Mexico.

Workshops

This year Corrales Historical Society offered two workshops to its members and the general public.

In April, Jason Younis y Delgado returned to teach the Spanish Colonial art of tin punching, after repeated requests from CHS members. Jason, a noted tin artist who exhibits his work throughout New Mexico, presented the history of the craft and shared his personal experience learning the techniques of tin punching from his grandmother. An enthusiastic instructor, Jason supplied attendees with sheets of tin as well as a wide assortment of tools that could be used to create patterned designs for mirrors, picture frames and wall decorations. Everyone completed projects during the workshops and had enough material and patterns to continue to make additional items at their leisure at home. Jason enjoys teaching at the Old Church and finds the members of CHS are quick to share his passion for this historical craft. The workshop was fully attended, and if there is more demand, we will invite Jason back again in the future.



In November, Sean Wells taught a workshop on creating retablos which are devotional paintings using iconography, such as images of saints, derived from traditional Catholic Church art. Sean is an award-winning santera and host of "New Mexican Santera" retablo painting show. She is a juried member of the Spanish Colonial Arts



Society and a fifth-generation Spanish Colonial artist. Her artwork is featured on products that have been distributed all over the world and were featured on Day of the Dead themed New Mexico Lottery scratchers. Sean supplied patterns for people to transfer a large selection of her images using traditional methods or they could create their own images. After selecting an image, she taught how to transfer the image onto blank boards. She provided each student with a take-home starter kit of pigments, and an extra blank board for students to continue the craft at home. Sean received very enthusiastic feedback from her students:

"Sean was great—an extremely good teacher," said Jan Kunz.

"Sean was a terrific teacher and the most generous person! Shared everything from tools to patterns to tricks to time and history. Sean just has a dynamic spark that carried over into everything she did. Her 'lesson plan' was extremely well thought out and flowed so well! Excellent, excellent!" commented Carolyn O'Mara.

CHS is planning two more workshops for 2017. On April 29, Francisco Uviña from the University of New Mexico School of Architecture and Planning will be teaching a workshop on adobe architecture and construction, including hands-on techniques for creating and building with adobe bricks. In November, John Perea will offer a class on traditional New Mexican cooking at his establishment, **Perea's Tijuana Bar and Restaurant**.
